1,023,741 seniors in B.C.

19.7% of population

5,197,224 total population




Stats

- 93% aged 65+ live independently
- 72% aged 85+ live independently
- 10% aged 85+ live in retirement/AL
- 15% aged 85+ live in long-term care
- Median income \$29,630
- 29% of seniors receive GIS
 - 65+ employment rate 15% (approximately 144,000 seniors)
 - 65-69 employment rate 26% (approximately 85,000 seniors)

Recent Actions and Activities for Seniors

- Commitment ncrease to OAS by 10% for those aged 75+
- Increase to the B.C. Seniors Supplement in April 2021 (bringing the rate for a single person to \$99.30/month)
- SAFER (expanded eligibility and increased benefits in September 2018)
- Fair PharmaCare (income based, helps low-income B.C. residents pay for prescription drugs, medical supplies, and pharmacy services)
- Adult Day Programs extended (investment of \$75 million)
- Increase in funding for long-term care as a response to COVID-19
- Increased funding to BC211 and Better at Home

 Rural services across areas (housing, health care, transportation)

 - Examined 365 outbreaks at 210 sites between March 1, 2020, and February 28, 2021


- Staying Apart to Stay Safe: The Impact of Visit Restrictions on Long-Term Care and Assisted Living Survey
 - OSA report published November 3, 2020
 - Reflects the experiences of 13,000 residents, family members, friends and the general public on the impact of visit restrictions



Long-Term Care/Assisted Living & COVID-19

- Review of COVID-19 Outbreaks in Care Homes in British Columbia
 - Examined 365 outbreaks at 210 sites between March 1, 2020, and February 28, 2021
 - 72% of outbreaks were contained to four or fewer cases
 - 75% of outbreaks had no COVID-19 fatalities
 - Overall case fatality rate of 30%
- Residents and staff of long-term care were 3x more likely to contract COVID-19
- Residents were 32.6x more likely to die from COVID-19 than members of the population at large
- Strong link between low levels of RN coverage and high COVID-19 case counts
- Largest outbreaks were at sites with low amounts of paid sick leave
- Testing was not uniform
- Report recommended: expand sick leave, address staffing shortages, decrease contracting, increase number of RNs, increase testing, eliminate shared rooms, mandatory vaccinations for all staff and booster shots for residents

Frequency of Pre/Post Visits

Frequency	Pre-Pandemic	Currently
Daily	18%	4%
Several times per week, but not always daily	41%	10%
Weekly	20%	56%
Every other week	6%	14%


Duration of Pre/Post Visits

Duration	Pre-Pandemic	Currently
30 minutes or less	4%	44%
30 minutes to one hour	27%	34%
One hour to two hours	39%	9%
Two to four hours	19%	1%
More than four hours	7%	<1%

- 65% of visits were observed by staff for some or all of the time
- Only 21% of visits were in the privacy of the resident's room
- 70% of visitors
 were not allowed
 to touch their
 loved ones
